Robin was the only youngster picked to give testimony at The First Ladies Conference on Drug Abuse, the biggest event Mrs. Reagan has staged in her crusade against drugs.

In her presentation, Robin said that when she started using drugs she began skipping school and not doing her work. She

"I remember stealing a wallet, and my mother called the police and they came," she said: "I remember feeling ashamed because I never thought I would steal something,"

Robin also told the group about an overdose incident.

"When I got to the hospital and my parents came, I felt so afraid and ashamed," she said. "My mom was holding my hand and I kept thinking 'Oh.-God, don't let me wake up because I can't stand to see her face again.' I couldn't believe I'd.
