The ALPHA Program at Pinellas Park Elementary School, St. Petersburg, Florida, is one of ten ALPHA projects in the state. Operation PAR initiated the program in Pinellas County three Bolin medition years ago.

The ALPHA Program is a school-based prevention program serving children, ages 9 through 12, who show early signs of having future personal, social or academic problems. The goal is to prevent later problems by intervening in the early stage of child development by stopping self-defeating patterns of behavior from ever starting or continuing. The program seeks to teach these

of their regular classes three days a week to attend classes in the ALPHA Center. In addition to their regular academic program, they receive group and individual counseling. At the conclusion of the 15-week period, they "graduate" and return to their regular classrooms.

Two things about the project are of special interest. child is accepted into ALPHA, their parents must commit to meet with the counsellors and the teachers at least once every two weeks. Children whose parents won't participate are not accepted. The family aspect of child development is an essential part of the program.

Second, the program, while it is run in the schools, is coordinated and administered by an outside drug prevention facility. In this case, the school provides the classroom and a teacher, and Operation Parental Awareness and Responsibility provides the counsellors and coordinator.

This program is funded by a special appropriation by the Florida State Legislature with supplemental funds from the Pinellas County United Way. SUSAN KING

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
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Due to questions in the press emanating from the Court hearing today concerning STRAIGHT, Inc. the parties (and some parents through counsel) are hopeful that this statement will help alleviate public and parental concerns.

The parties share a desire that children with drug problems receive appropriate care and treatment if their individual needs require such services.

The Parties have agreed on a process to review and then resolve the concerns that they, parents or clients may have about STRAIGHT, INC. This process includes the nomination of an independent committee to confirm the adequacy of the admission, treatment and discharge procedures utilized in the program, in general and in respect to the remaining habeas corpus petitions. This review will include cooperation on an interim basis, review of all complaints, cooperating within the ongoing Department of Human Resources <u>licensing</u> process, and negotiations to make any necessary long-term adjustments in the program.

Each side further regrets any undue concerns of parents or children which may have arisen. Each side acknowledges that the other has proceeded in good faith on all petitions and in regard to Travis Crow and acknowledges that such actions proved unnecessary, as the evidence indicated he was voluntarily participating in the program

All parties agree to a postponement of the habeas corpus hearing in the hope that the process agreed upon to review STRAIGHT will lessen present concerns and allow dismissal of the habeus actions.

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
