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## CORPORATE SPONSORS TURN TO THE GREENER FIELDS OF POLO

You've heard of the Shearson Lehman Brothers Tournament of Champions in tennis and the Nabisco Dinah Shore tournament in in golf. Now there's another corporate sports sponsorship: the Timeplex Polo Cup.

The main goal of Timeplex isn't the publicity of sport sponsorship. **It hopes its polo event will make money to benefit KIDS of Bergen County, a nonprofit alcohol and drug rehabilitation program in Hackensack.**

Timeplex, based in Woodcliff Lake, is one of nine companies from New Jersey and New York to sponsor tournaments at the Ramapo Hunt and Polo Club in Mahwah this year, up from seven last year.

"Obviously the company could have made a straight contribution," said Tony Squeglia, a spokesman for the telecommunications company. "But we look at it as an opportunity to raise money for a good cause and have a day's outing with the family. "

The company, headed by Chairman and President Edward Botwinick, donated \$5,000 to sponsor its first Timeplex Polo Cup. That and the first \$2,500 from ticket sales go to maintain the club playing field, said Charles Elmes, the club president. Additional proceeds from sales of the tickets \$6 advance, \$8 at the gate go to the group.

The match starts at 1:30 p.m. May 30 at the Route 202 club.

"We try to break even on the thing," Elmes said. "The charities can make a bundle. Good Samaritan Hospital made \$45,000 last year, and they were real happy. "

Other companies sponsoring matches in the spring and fall are: UA Columbia Cablevision of New Jersey, Midlantic North National Bank, Prudential-Bache Securities Inc., Chase Manhattan of New Jersey, Tri-State Cadillac, Bennett Brothers of Mahwah, the Tantene division of Proctor & Gamble, and Wide World of Cars, a Ferrari dealership.

Charities and other organizations that will benefit from the proceeds include Tomorrow's Children, a group that helps terminally ill children at Hackensack Medical Center, The Valley Hospital in Ridgewood, and the Lupus Foundation of New Jersey.

Others are Good Samaritan Hospital in Suffern, N.Y., the Ramapo College Foundation, the West Bergen Mental Health Center in Ridgewood, the Mahwah Ambulance Corps, and the Ramapo Mountain Scholarship Fund.

The portable electroencephalogram has a cassette tape and is worn on a belt. Twelve wires from the unit are taped to the patient's head, and the tape records electrical impulses from the brain. Neurologists later study a printout of the recorded information, which is then used in the diagnosis.
