Mrs. Yarborough and Incumbent Jess Yarborough Listen to Returns

Runoff Likely in New 5th District

In the new 5th District, which stretches from Orlando to the Gulf Coast, State Sen. Bill Gunter defeated Miller Newton, former president of the Florida Young Democrats

With 39 per cent of the vote counted, Gunter had a lead of 7,664 to 1,373 over his opponent, who took a leave of absence from the University of South Florida to make the race.

In that district's GOP contest, a runoff seemed inevitable between Charles Rainey of Clearwater with 1,835 votes and Jack Insko of Port Richey with 1,546. Jack Martin of Orlando had polled 383 votes and Mike Snyder of Dade City 139 in the contest. Martin, 35, had said he was the only GOP nominee who could win because he lived in Orlando. He said his three opponents lived in the western side of the district and could not be ex-

pected to draw Orlando's strong Republican vote.

The 13th District in north Dade County and south Broward presented the biggest Democratic congressional scramble in the state with seven candidates running

Running were George Balmer of Broward County, Johnny Davis, a 44-year-old attorney; Jay Kislak, 50, a millionaire financier; former Dade County School Board Chairman William Lehman; black school teacher Betty Page; State Sen. Lee Weissenborn of Miami; and State Rep. Louis Wolfson, 45, of Miami. Weissenborn held a slim early lead.

The Republican race was dull by comparison with only three candidates — Paul Bethel, 52, a magazine writer; Ralph Milone, 28, a former member of the Dade County GOP Executive Committee; and Marvin (Luky) Mondres, 47, a former aide to Rep. Herbert Burke

Bethel was the early leader with 193 votes.

The only incumbent with a free ride back to Washington this year is Rep. Lou Frey of Winter Park, who was unopposed in the Republican race yesterday and will be unopposed in November in the 9th District.

Florida's other two Republican congressmen, C W (Bill) Young of St. Petersburg in the 6th District and J. Herbert Burke in the 12th District, had no Republican opposition yesterday but will have Democratic opponents on Nov. 7.

Democrat incumbents who were unopposed yesterday but who will face GOP opposition in November include Charles Bennett of Jacksonville, 3rd District; Bill Chappell, Ocala, 4th; Sam Gibbons, Tampa, 7th; James Haley, Sarasota 8th; Paul Rogers, West Palm Beach 11th; and Dante Fascell, Miami, 15th.
