14-year-old brother, Benson, filed a \$1.1 million lawsuit against the drug rehabilitation program last week for conditions the younger ' claims he experienced in the program when he was 12. Since both plaintiffs are juveniles, their suits were filed through their mother, Marcia, by Sarasota attorney Larry Byrd.

He charges that Tay was "falsely imprisoned" in the facility and, as the result of four months of repeatedly running away from the program and being caught and returned, "suffered physical and psychological pain... and physical handi-cap." He said the physical handicap refers to a possible bladder injury the youth may have suffered when he was denied use of a bathroom except at certain times of the day.

Byrd's two-count suit terms the boy's treatment in the program an "outrageous disregard" for his rights.
